# 4. OTHER COMMITTEE GOVERNANCE MATTERS

## A) "Ready, Set, Go ... to Kindergarten" Presentation

Ms. Flannery and Ms. Warwaruk provided a very thorough presentation on the "Ready, Set, Go to Kindergarten" initiative currently being implemented in four elementary schools – Earl Oxford, New Era (French and English), Valleyview and Betty Gibson.

In their presentation emphasis was given to the preparatory and preventative nature of the program and its essentiality for all Brandon School Division elementary schools. Please see Appendix A for presentation document. Discussion ensued with consideration being given to the need to coordinate and consolidate this initiative with the current kindergarten/early years work in the Division; the costs of implementing the initiative in Brandon School Division elementary schools and the need for a Board policy on kindergarten and junior kindergarten services in the Division.

Ms. Flannery and Ms. Warwaruk were thanked for their fine presentation.

<u>Agreed</u>: That the Board of Trustees request the Education Committee to develop a proposed policy for kindergarten and prekindergarten educational services in the Brandon School Division.

#### B) international Anti-Homophobia Day – May 17, 2010

This item was brought forward from the October 13, 2009 Board Meeting and the December 14, 2009 Education Committee meetings. The matter arose from a Trustee inquiry at the October 13, 2009 Board Meeting: "if the Education Committee would consider reviewing the possibility of recognition of International Anti Homophobia Day for Grades 9 – 12 students held during May 2010".

The Committee discussed this matter from several perspectives including the scope of discrimination being faced by today's students, the extent of possible recognition, the Senior High Schools' roles in such recognition, the involvement of student voice, community perspectives.

It was decided that prior to the possibility of recognizing this day the Committee required further information on:

- what other Manitoba school divisions are doing to recognize the day;
- · the views of the Senior High Principals; and
- the views of the Student Councils.

This information will be sought with Senior Administration to bring a report back to the February, 2010 Education Committee.

# C) Implementation of Middle Years Assessment of Key Competencies in Math, Reading Comp, Expository Writing and Student Engagement

This item was brought forward from the Education Committee Meeting of December 14, 2009, being referred from the Board Meeting of October 13, 2009.

Chair Coey emphasized the importance of this Ministry document as it forms the basis of the proposed Policy 5042 on "The Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting of Student Learning". It will be circulated to all Trustees as background information for the forthcoming consideration of Policy and Procedures 5042.

## D) Ongoing Development of High Ability Learner Enrichment Programming (HALEP)

This was brought forward from the Education Committee Meeting of December 14, 2009. Previous discussion had taken place on the need for policy development in this area. A Board policy from Bethel, Oregon on Gifted and Talented Programs for all students was reviewed. It was noted by Trustees that this was one of several such policies.

<u>Agreed</u>: That current Board Policy/Procedures 4044 "Appropriate Educational Programming" requires amending to include direction on the matter of appropriate education for high ability learners. Such an amendment is to include:

- the identification process, including tools;
- teacher professional development and education;
- · programming considerations;
- preparation of IEPs:
- the inclusion of the requirement for HALEP in the teachers' annual growth plans

In preparation of this amendment the input of the Principals and current HALEP teachers will be sought. Dr. Michaels, Superintendent, will bring a proposed amendment to Policy/Procedures 4044 at the March 2010 Education Committee Meeting.

#### E) Brandon RHA Regional Report

This item was brought forward from the Education Committee Meeting of December 14, 2009.

<u>Agreed</u>: Given the importance of this report it was agreed that representatives of the Brandon Regional Health Authority (BRHA) be invited to a forthcoming Education Committee meeting to present the report and discuss the implications, actions, follow-up taken by the BRHA and its partners on the findings and recommendations.

#### F) Breakfast for Learning Manitoba Chapter

A request has been made by the Breakfast for Learning Manitoba Chapter for Trustee Ramona Coey to become a member of the Chapter. Committee members agreed to present this request to the Board of Trustees at the January 11, 2010 meeting for approval.

### Recommendation:

That Trustee Coey be approved to become a member of the Breakfast for Learning Manitoba Chapter.
