a) BDO Canada LLP, Chartered Accountants, undated, advising that they have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Brandon School Division, which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at June 30, 2017 and the consolidated statements of revenue, expenditures and accumulated surplus, change in net debt and cash flow for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information. They believe the audit evidence they obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for their unqualified audit opinion. In their opinion, these consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Brandon School Division as at June 30, 2017 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards. The financial information presented in the schedules to the consolidated financial statements was derived from the accounting records tested by them as part of the auditing procedures followed in their examination of the financial statements and, in their opinion, they are fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

#### Referred motions.

Mr. Todd Birkhan, Auditing Partner of BDO Canada LLP, Chartered Accounts, joined the Board at the table and spoke to the 2016-2017 Audited Financial Statements. Mr. Birkhan had also attended the Finance and Facilities Committee Meeting on October 17, 2017, and provided a description of the audit process and the methodology used in the course of their audit and discussed their findings in the audit process. The audit was conducted in accordance with Canadian Generally Accepted Auditing Standards and encompassed testing the balances and disclosures included in the financial statements provided by management. For the year ended June 30, 2017, it is their opinion that the financial statements are presented in accordance with the basis of accounting required by the Manitoba Education for School Divisions which includes the use of the Public Sector Accounting Board (PSAB) reporting requirements. They have provided a document stating that they are

providing an opinion that those financial statements are materially correct and they also provide a similar same opinion for the student enrolment.

Mr. Birkhan indicated that there are two sets of financial statements encompassed within the body of the statements. Number one, the statements themselves are a consolidated set of financial statements. The consolidated set of financial statements include a statement of financial position and a consolidated income statement to start. That includes both operating and capital activities. It is important to note that those first two consolidated pages don't entirely represent what the division budgets to, and what is required to be raised from taxpayers. They encompass and are required to effectively generate an operating surplus on an annual basis because they also include the required surplus to reinvest and pay for increase in capital asset basis. When we start talking about the second set of statements, there is a second income statement and a second statement of financial position which is just on your operating fund. The operating fund is the one that ties more closely into the budget process and that operating statement effectively deals with the revenue coming into the School Division on an annual basis, the majority of which are government grants and property tax revenues, or funds allocated through the property tax system. The operating statement also shows expenditures, of which the most is spent on payroll. There are also facility costs, and other costs associated with running a school division.

Mr. Birkhan noted that in the 2016-2017 year, the operating statement shows a surplus. The surplus on \$98M worth of revenue is \$39,302 after transfers to capital. That is effectively a break-even position from an operating perspective. The current year's surplus does get added to the accumulated surplus at the start of the year and ultimately the undesignated surplus after adding that \$39,000 is about \$2.7M at the end of the year. That represents 2.8% of the Division's overall operating expenses. The surplus overall is 8 working days of expenses. Mr. Birkhan indicated that the Province mandates surplus maximums. With those surplus maximums, it's important to maintain a surplus to be able to deal with things as they come along. Having the ability to deal with potential future employee benefits, to deal with potential contracts that might span year-ends, it's important to maintain a surplus so you're not forced to make short-term cash flow decisions that may be actual long term bad investment decisions. It is important to maintain some level of reserve funds also to finance and smooth out capital expenses. It is important for proper long-term fiscal management to have resources available for capital and to have resources available for operating activities. He stressed that we have to be careful on how we interpret the figures because there are a number of pages and the statements do include a consolidated set but it is important to look at the operating set that deals with what's in and what's out on an annual basis. Mr. Birkhan noted that the Brandon School Division's financial affairs are in very strong hands. The Division has a very professional team in the finance department staff. They provide strong information to management and to the Board of Trustees. He thanked Mr. Labossiere and his team for their cooperation during the course of the audit.

Trustee Sefton thanked Mr. Birkhan his work and for presenting valuable information to the Finance and Facilities Committee last week Mr. Sefton noted that the media had recently reported information using the consolidated financial statements instead of the operating statements. Trustee Sefton stressed that the net surplus is \$39,302. When making decisions, the Division makes them based on the operating statements, not the consolidated statements.

Trustee Ross thanked Mr. Birkhan for his work and also recognized the work of Mr. Labossiere and Ms. Eunice Jamora, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, and the rest of their team for doing such an admirable job day in and day out.

He feels that there are enough resources in the system to deal with this issue and make it a priority. Mr. Malazdrewicz added that some of the information contained in the Tell Them From Me (TTFM) Survey results does give us some insight into some areas for potential response. We have a wide range of activities that we engage in and a number of them are Divisionally based such as YR kids, Day of Pink, and some of the leadership pieces. Schools use a range of activities and they are tailored to the particular community of each school. He added that the Division is exploring a couple of programs now that may incorporate some pre-and-post opportunities built within some packaged programs. The Division would need to look at the success and the types of information that will be received and what can be done with the information. Dr. Casavant suggested that the University could be approached with this topic as a possible research project.

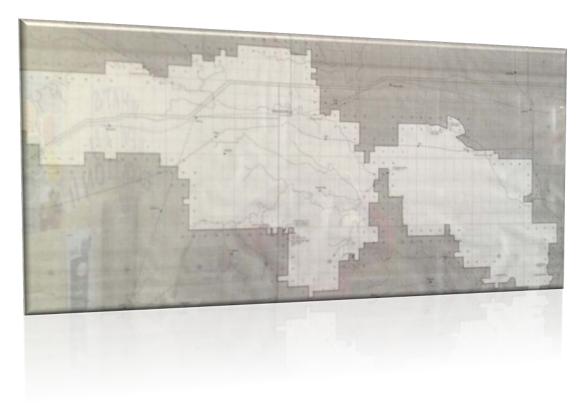

#### **Geographic Information**

Brandon School Division's Administration Office is located in Brandon, Manitoba, Canada. The Division services the City of Brandon, the Town of Alexander, Canadian Forces Base Shilo and surrounding areas.

There are 22 schools in the Brandon School Division, 19 of which are located within the City of Brandon. The Brandon School Division boundary extends beyond the boundaries of the City of Brandon and includes parts of the municipalities of Cornwallis, Riverdale, Elton, Oakland-Wawanesa, North Cypress-Langford, Glenboro-South Cypress and Whitehead as well as Canadian Forces Base Shilo. Students who live outside the City limits and are 1.6 kilometers or more from their catchment schools are provided with school bus transportation. Transportation service is also provided within the City limits to students who take French Immersion, who are handicapped, physically disabled or otherwise qualify due to distance walked.



Schools vary in grade and structures and although not physically structured in this matter, all schools in Brandon follow the Early (K-4), Middle (5-8) and Senior Years (9-12) philosophy.

The Brandon School Division operates a neighbourhood school concept whereby students in elementary school attend the school according to their catchment area. At the middle years' level, school catchment areas have been established to ensure reasonable class sizes while protecting the right of students to attend schools built to serve their neighbourhoods. The high schools operate on an open boundaries concept. If a student wants a special program, i.e. vocational or French Immersion, catchment areas do not apply and they will enroll in the appropriate school.

#### **Divisional Programming**

Brandon School Division supports our vision of educational excellence by offering our students a wide variety of programs and services suited to individual learning needs and strengths.

#### **Aboriginal Education**

Aboriginal Education initiatives in the Brandon School The AP Program challenges students, provides access to Division are designed to provide assistance to Instructional and Support staff they integrate Aboriginal perspectives into their daily teaching activities.

#### **Career Education / Work Placements**

Brandon School Division students and staff continue to enjoy a wealth of support for our community work placements. On an annual basis, more than 175 local businesses and organizations host students for their work placements.

Work Placement is one of several delivery mechanisms that may be used to achieve the teaching/learning goals, objectives, and/or outcomes stated in department-developed, registered or approved curricula/courses.

#### Neelin High School Off Campus ("NHSOC")

NHSOC is an initiative of the Brandon School Division that opened its doors to the public in September of 2007. The school offers students who have been out of school the opportunity to complete their education in a more flexible setting.

It is our intention to meet the needs of students who do not function well within the traditional high school setting. Course requirements here are the same as they are at other Manitoba High School.

#### Advanced Placement Program ("AP")

#### International Baccalaureate Diploma Program ("IB")

The IB Diploma Programme for students aged 16 to 19 is a challenging two-year curricula leading to final examinations and a qualification that is welcomed by leading universities around the world.

In some cases, students who participate in the IB Diploma Programme will also fulfill the requirements of their province's curriculum and examination.

#### **Divisional Professional Development**

Brandon School Division is committed to providing Professional Development to our staff to support our Continuous Improvement Plan.

During the 2016-2017 School Year, a committee was formed to examine the factors impacting the school calendar. This committee consisted of representatives from Senior Administration, School Leaders (K-8 and 9-12), and Presidents from BTA & CUPE Local 737. The committee considered factors including provincial exams, semester balance, parent teacher interviews, professional development needs, parent concerns, and legislative and provincial requirements.

In support of our new Continuous Improvement Plan, the 2017-2018 School Calendar will:

- Reduce costs for the delivery of professional development;
- Increase alignment of calendars between K-8 and 9-12;
- Change 3 full-day professional development days to 6 half-days;
- Provide a platform to better respond to new Continuous Improvement Framework focused on improving student achievement; and
- Comply fully with Legislation & Provincial requirements.

During the 2016-2017 School Year, Brandon School Division LEAN Management Training was initiated by our Department of Human Resources. The core purpose of LEAN is to increase productivity and minimize waste within an organization. To date, Brandon School Division has trained 19 staff, school administrators and members of Senior Administration in LEAN Management.

A further part of our Divisional Professional Development journey included Project Management Training through the Project Management Institute and MNP LLP. Project Management is the application of knowledge skills, tools and techniques to project activities to meet the project requirements. To date, Brandon School Division has trained 32 staff, school administrators and members of Senior Administration in Project Management. Project Management Boards have appeared in several of our buildings to help initiate, plan, execute, monitor, control and close different projects within our schools and administrative departments.

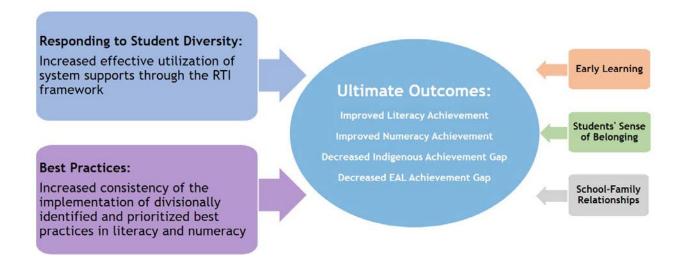

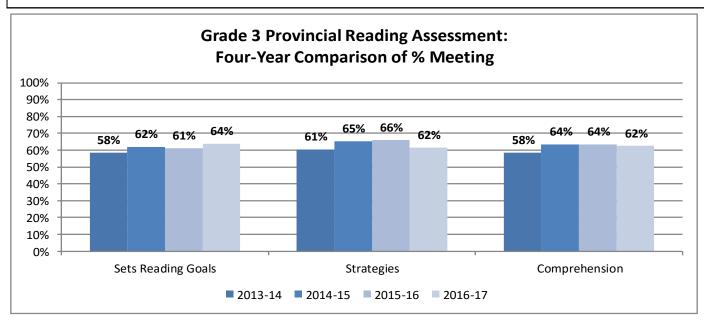

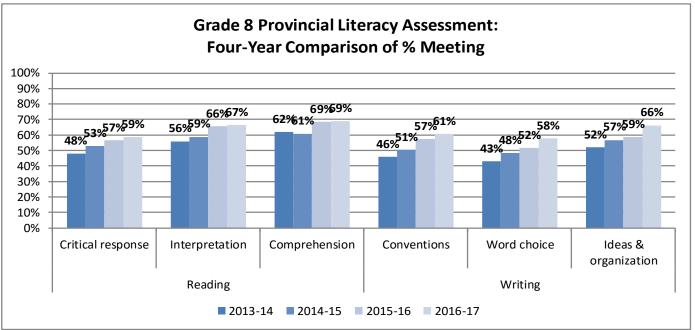

## STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT LITERACY

**Strategic Plan Literacy Goal:** By 2017, 80% of Brandon School Division students will demonstrate literacy competencies at grade level.

The grade 3 provincial reading assessment measures the extent to which students are achieving early grade 3 reading expectations. The grade 8 provincial literacy assessment measures the extent to which students are achieving mid grade 8 reading and writing expectations. Graphs are based on a weighted average of the English and French Immersion program results.



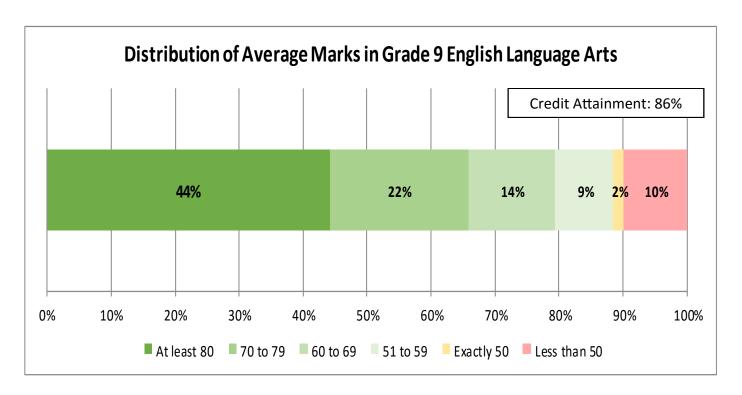


Over the last four years, we have seen steady growth in the percentage of students meeting grade level expectations in each of the grade 8 reading and writing sub-competencies. While improvement was seen in Grade 3 reading competencies in previous years, a small decline is noted in the 2016-2017 school year.



Strategic Plan Literacy Goal: By 2017, 80% of Brandon School Division students will demonstrate literacy competencies at grade level.

Credit attainment in Grade 9 English Language Arts is defined as the number of first-time grade 9 students who receive a Grade 9 ELA credit over the number of students originally enrolled in the course. Mark distribution indicates levels of achievement for those students who completed the course.

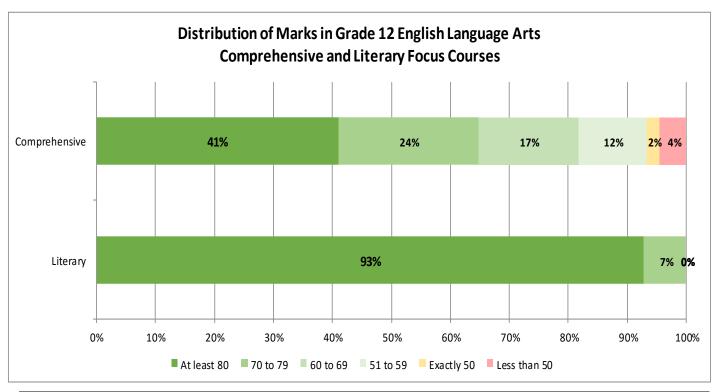


Of the 612 grade 9 students originally enrolled in grade 9 English Language Arts in September 2016, 86% attained the credit. Furthermore, of the 582 students who completed the course, 90% passed the course. While the credit attainment rate dropped by 3% this year, students who passed the course did so with higher overall marks than in the previous year.



**Strategic Plan Literacy Goal:** By 2017, 80% of Brandon School Division students will demonstrate literacy competencies at grade level.

Credit attainment in Grade 12 English Language Arts is defined as the number of students who receive the Grade 12 ELA course credit over the number of students originally enrolled in each course. Mark distribution indicates levels of achievement for those students who completed the course.



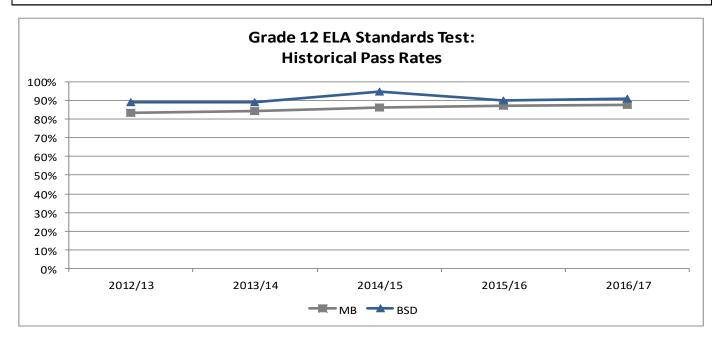

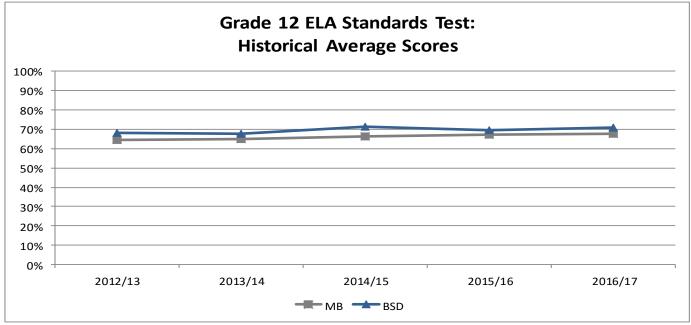
Students enrolled in the Grade 12 Literary Focus course continue to demonstrate high success rates, with 98% obtaining the credit. The majority of Grade 12 students enrolled in the Comprehensive Focus course, and while there was a 9% decrease in the percentage of students who obtained the credit this year, there was a 10% increase in the amount of students obtaining an 80% or above as their final mark.

The grade 12 provincial English Language Arts standards test counts for 30% of students' final grades in language arts.



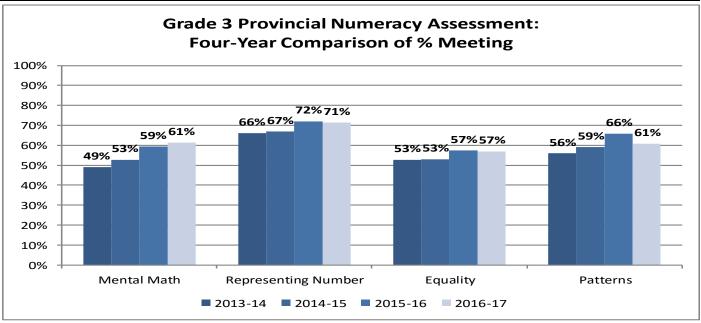


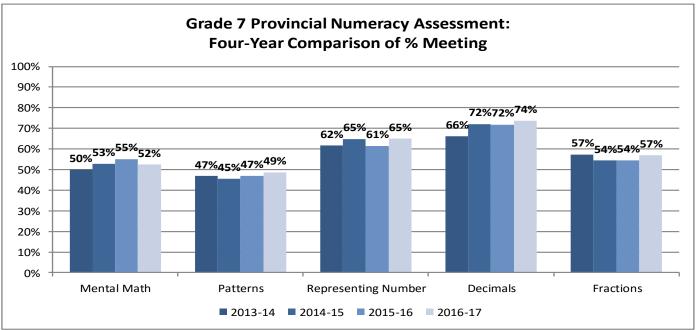
Brandon School Division students continue to have high levels of success on the English Language Arts provincial standards test, with 91% of Brandon School Division students passing the test, and the divisional test average consistently surpassing the provincial average every year.

## NUMERACY

**Strategic Plan Numeracy Goal:** By 2017, 80% of Brandon School Division students will demonstrate numeracy competencies at grade level.

The grade 3 provincial numeracy assessment measures the extent to which students are achieving early grade 3 numeracy expectations, while the grade 7 provincial numeracy assessment measures the extent to which students are achieving mid-grade 7 numeracy expectations. Graphs are based on a weighted average of the English and French Immersion program results.



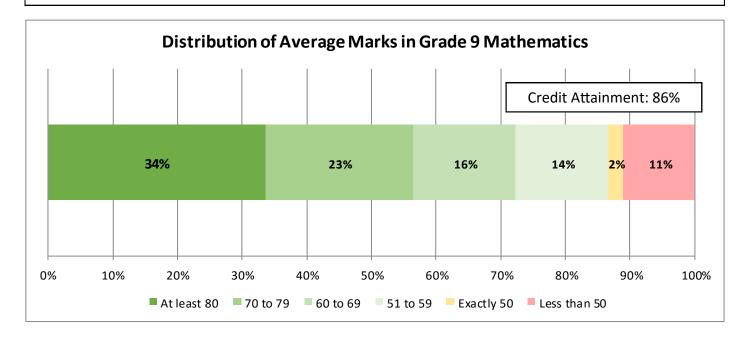


This year, we saw a continuation of the long-term steady improvements in most numeracy competencies. Continued close monitoring of achievement in mental math and patterning is warranted given that %5 fewer students met grade 3 expectations in patterning and 3% fewer students met grade 7 mental math expectations compared with the previous year.



**Strategic Plan Numeracy Goal:** By 2017, 80% of Brandon School Division students will demonstrate numeracy competencies at grade level.

Credit attainment in Grade 9 Mathematics is defined as the number of first-time grade 9 students who receive a Grade 9 Math credit over the number of students originally enrolled in the course. Mark distribution indicates levels of achievement for those students who completed the course.

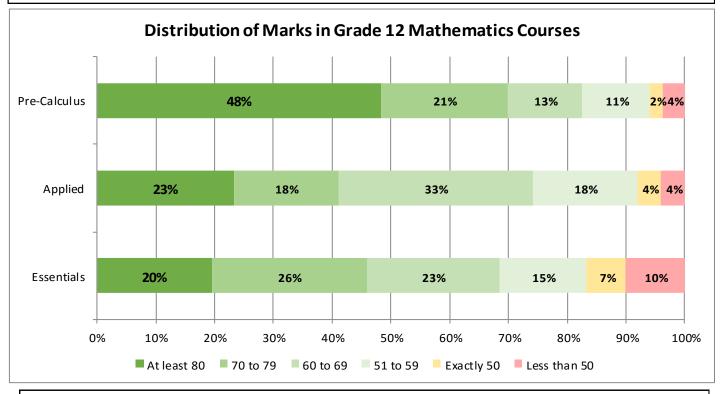


Of the 639 grade 9 students originally enrolled in Grade Mathematics in September 2016, 86% attained the credit, and of the 618 students who completed the course, 89% passed the course. Credit attainment rates for this course were 5% lower than in the previous year, and on average the final marks were also lower.



**Strategic Plan Numeracy Goal:** By 2017, 80% of Brandon School Division students will demonstrate numeracy competencies at grade level.

Credit attainment in Grade 12 Mathematics courses is defined as the number of students who receive the Grade 12 Math course credit over the number of students originally enrolled in each course. Mark distribution indicates levels of achievement for those students who completed the course.



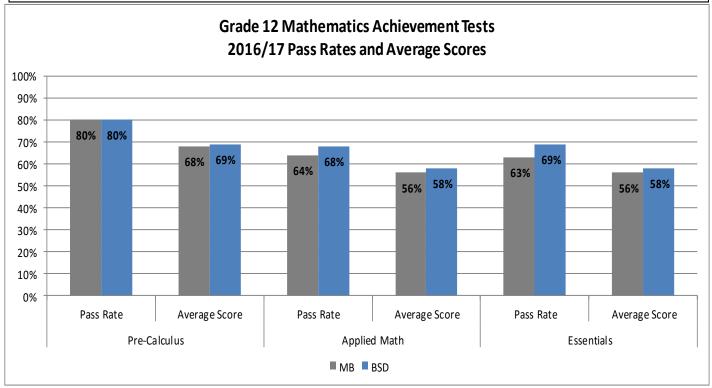
Credit Attainment Rates: Pre-Calculus: 87% Applied: 88% Essentials: 56%

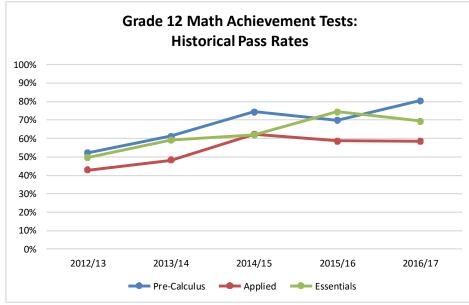
Credit attainment rates in Pre-Calculus remain high at 87%. Furthermore, compared with the previous year, the percentage of students attaining a final mark of 80% or higher more than doubled from 23% in 2015/16 to 48% in 2016/17. Credit attainment and average marks in Applied Mathematics also improved compared with the previous year, with a gain of 10% of students attaining a final mark of 80% or higher. However, in Essential Math, 4% fewer students attained the credit compared with the previous year, and fewer students attained top marks.

## NUMERACY NUMERACY

**Strategic Plan Numeracy Goal:** By 2017, 80% of Brandon School Division students will demonstrate numeracy competencies at grade level.

In Pre-calculus and Applied Mathematics., the grade 12 provincial achievement tests count for 30% of students' final grades in those courses. The Essential Mathematics provincial achievement test counts for 20% in that course.





We continue to strive to have higher pass rates and average scores on the three Grade 12 Mathematics Achievement tests. For each of these tests, Brandon School Division pass rates and average scores are on par with, or surpass, provincial results. Importantly, we are seeing a general trend over the past 5 years toward increasing pass rates on these achievement tests.

## CONCLUSION

In the Brandon School Division, we strive to provide all of our students with equitable, fair access to quality personalized learning opportunities. We have a very strong emphasis on academic preparedness, global citizenship and health and wellbeing. We are very pleased with our growth in these areas during the 2016-2017 school year.

During the 2016-2017 school year, using the Framework of Continuous Improvement, we launched our new Continuous Improvement Plan, aligning the priorities of the Department of Education & Training, our Board of Trustees, Senior Administration, School Leaders, Curriculum Specialists, our parents & students and our community at large. This plan represents a commitment to high overall achievement in Literacy and Numeracy, with no significant gaps in that achievement for Indigenous or English as an Additional Language Learners.

#### **EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING**

Nominations are now being accepted for the Manitoba Excellence in Teaching Awards, which recognize outstanding individuals whose educational practices have a profound impact on student

learning and engagement. There are five award categories: Teaching Excellence (three awards), Outstanding New Teacher, Outstanding Team Collaboration, Outstanding School Leader, and Premier's Award for Excellence in Education. Details about each of these categories can be found online or in the awards brochure. Nominations can be submitted until December 1 by people with direct knowledge of the nominee's contributions—students, parents, colleagues, school or divisional administrators, or trustees. Awards come with a certificate and a \$500 cash prize, and recipients will be honoured at an Excellence in Teaching reception.

#### **EXCELLENCE IN SUSTAINABILITY**

Did you know that Manitoba's Excellence in Sustainability Awards includes an education category? Sustainable development considers the long-term consequences of decisions and actions on the environment, the economy and human health and well-being. These awards recognize people, projects and ideas that successfully turn the principles of sustainable development into concrete, lasting achievements. The Education for Sustainability Award recognizes efforts involving public or private educational programs that incorporate sustainability into policies, operations and programs, or that enhance teaching and learning about sustainability, and the adoption of sustainability policies and practices. The award application deadline is noon on Friday, December 8, 2017.

#### **KEY RESULTS: CENSUS 2016**

Stats Canada's latest release of information from the 2016 census includes analysis in two areas that will be of special interest to educators:

<u>Aboriginal peoples in Canada</u> and immigration and ethnocultural diversity.



CENSUS · RECENSEMENT

Among the findings:

- In 2016, Aboriginal people in Canada accounted for 4.9% of the total population, up from 3.8% in 2006 and 2.8% in 1996.
   Since 2006, the Aboriginal population has grown by 42.5% more than four times the growth rate of the non-Aboriginal population over the same period.
- The Aboriginal population continues to be significantly younger than the non-Aboriginal population, with an average age of 32.1 years, compared to 40.9 years.
- There were more than 70 distinct Aboriginal languages reported in the 2016 Census, more than 30 of which had at least 500 speakers. There were 260,550 Aboriginal people who could speak an Aboriginal language in 2016, up 3.1% from 2006.
- Winnipeg has the highest Métis population of any metropolitan area in Canada: 52,130, up 28% from a decade earlier.
- One in five Canadians is now foreign born, and by 2036, that proportion could be as high as 30%.
- A greater proportion of immigrants are settling in the Prairies.
   Manitoba received 1.8% of immigrants to Canada in 2001; in 2016, that proportion had risen to 5.2%.
- Africa has surpassed Europe as a source continent for immigrants to Canada. It now ranks second only to Asia, and accounts for 13.4% of recent immigrants.

November 29 is the last <u>scheduled release date</u> for Census 2016 data. The November release will include information on education, labour, journey to and language at work, and mobility and migration.

#### **SUMMER SCHOOL PATROLS**

If you attended the recent October regional meetings, you'll remember that one of the presentations was an overview of association risk management services. (If you weren't in attendance, you can find the presentation here.) That presentation made mention of summer school patrols that risk management (under the auspices of MSI insurance) implemented a number of years ago. In summer 2017, a total of 2528 school patrols were conducted in Winnipeg, Brandon, Lorette and Iles des Chenes. There were also 14 neighbourhood watch calls related to suspicious school-ground activity. Construction sites and school roofs proved to be a big draw for after-hour activity, accounting for a large percentage of reports. There was also graffiti and vandalism reported, as well as incidents of after-hours trespassing. Incidents were not restricted to any particular area or areas, although some individual schools attracted more attention than others. These in turn were patrolled more frequently in a proactive effort to stop trouble before it started.

This month, we launched the first in a new series of webinars that will feature superintendents from across

the province, offering up their insights and expertise from their position as part of divisional leadership teams. The first webinar in this series aired earlier today, and featured Seine River superintendent Michael Borgfjord on supporting a culture of continuous change and improvement.

#### Long-Service Trustee Recognition



Annually, school trustees with 12, 16 and 20 years of service to public education are eligible to be recognized as long-service trustees.

Submissions for the Long-service Trustee Recognition are verified by the nominating division/district and reviewed by the association administration.



In 2018, Trustee Long-service Awards will be presented at the President's Banquet on the evening of Friday, March 16.

#### Presidents' Council Award

The Presidents' Council Award recognizes exemplary service and outstanding achievement, innovative thinking, personal initiative, and lasting and pervasive impact in the field of public education.



Professional educators, support staff and community members all contribute to successful student learning. Each year, on an alternating basis, nominations for this award will be accepted in one of two categories:

- Professional educators: teachers (classroom, resource, itinerant specialist teachers) or administrators (principals, divisional coordinators, senior administrators); or
- Support staff and community members: support staff (educational assistants, bus drivers, clerical, custodial and maintenance personnel) or community members (volunteers, parents, trustees, post-secondary and civil service personnel).

In 2018, nominations will be accepted in the category of support staff and community members.

Nominations for the Presidents' Council Award are evaluated and ranked by a selection committee. The selection committee consists of the association's president and vice-presidents, along with the three most recent (active) past presidents.



NEW In 2018, the Presidents' Council Award will be presented at the President's Banquet on the evening of Friday, March 16.

The deadline for Presidents' Council Award nominations is January 26, 2018. Nomination forms can be found at the end of this package or on the association website.

#### Premier Award for School Board Innovation

The Premier Award for School Board Innovation recognizes educational innovations and improvements advanced or directed by boards of education to support and enhance student achievement. For 2018, the sponsor, Xerox Canada Ltd., has committed \$3,000 to award one prize in Manitoba. The prize is to be used to support or extend the innovation or project.



A panel established to review applications will select the award winner. The broad purpose of the award is to recognize and celebrate school board involvement in the improvement of learning opportunities for Manitoba children and youth.

Innovations will not be reviewed by the judging panel in-person; a decision will be based solely on written school board submissions. The selection panel will rely upon the following criteria in their determination of the award recipient:

- innovative nature of the program or project;
- sustainability of the innovation within the present system or school;
- ability to transfer the innovation to other systems or schools;
- · cost of the innovation relative to benefits achieved;
- client support for the innovation; and
- · evidence of improved student achievement.



The 2018 convention program *will not* include the innovation showcase that has featured Premier Award nominees in recent years. Nominees will no longer be required to participate in a showcase in order to be eligible for this award. The award will be presented at lunch on Friday, March 16.

#### Student Citizenship and AMM George Harbottle Memorial Award





The Manitoba School Boards Association Student Citizenship Awards program for public school students in Manitoba recognizes outstanding young people throughout Manitoba who are active participants in their communities and schools. Seven awards are given annually, one to a student in each of the association's six geographic regions, and one provincial award to a student group. The awards take the form of a certificate and \$500. Students nominated but not selected to receive an individual award will receive a certificate and \$100. There are no age or grade restrictions on this award; all students in regular attendance in the K-12 program at a Manitoba public school are eligible.

The Association of Manitoba Municipalities (AMM) will further recognize one of the association's individual award winners by way of the AMM George Harbottle Memorial Award, in recognition of outstanding contributions at the community level. This award consists of \$1000.

The Manitoba School Boards Association Student Citizenship Award recognizes students from Manitoba schools who demonstrate their commitment to the values of citizenship through activities such as:

- 1. volunteer service to the community (i.e. service to health care facilities, senior citizen groups, shelters, day care centres.
- 2. involvement in citizenship or character building organizations.
- 3. participation in student government programs or activities.
- 4. leadership ability to motivate others to actions to benefit the community.

The AMM George Harbottle Memorial Award focuses specifically on those contributions that a student has made in the greater community, beyond the school walls.

The seven regionally-based directors who serve on the association's provincial executive will act as the selection committee for the Student Citizenship Awards. Representatives of AMM will select from among the individual winners of the Manitoba School Boards Association Student Citizenship Awards one student to receive the AMM George Harbottle Memorial Award.



In 2018, the student awards will be presented at lunch on Thursday, March 15. Award recipients will be invited to receive their award in person. Alternatively, they may submit a brief video that will be played at the time of the award presentation.

#### Dear Minister Friesen:

Thank you for this opportunity to share public school boards' perspectives as you embark on the challenging task of setting our province's financial course for the next year and beyond. As the bodies elected to govern Manitoba's public school system, the 38 school boards that comprise this association's membership have an obvious interest in ensuring that the education system is appropriately resourced. Beyond that, however, we all share a fundamental concern for the well-being of all children in every aspect of their lives. The comments that follow will reflect both of those priorities.

#### **Education finance and related matters**

The brief that we submitted at the time of last year's pre-budget consultations outlined several areas where we believe legislative, regulatory, or other changes could positively impact school boards' ability to deliver improved services, at little or no additional cost to the province or local taxpayers.

In the intervening year, the provincial government has acted on one of those recommendations, namely the elimination of the 20-student cap on class size in kindergarten to grade three classrooms. Research fails to show that such a reduction in class size leads to significantly improved student learning outcomes. What is clear, however, is that the cap came with significant capital and operational costs, and negatively impacted school boards' ability to manage resources. On behalf of school boards, I would like to thank your government for making this change.

Two other major recommendations were included in our 2017 budget brief.

The elimination on the moratorium on school closures: Since its introduction, the moratorium has required many school boards to expend money to maintain and upgrade what is effectively surplus space, and to staff classrooms for students who might actually be better served in a larger, nearby facility. We would once again urge the provincial government to introduce the necessary amendments to *The Public Schools Act* to eliminate the moratorium. At the same time, we would look forward to working with the government to establish new school closing guidelines that would ensure that no school is closed without appropriate community consultations.

Revisions to the funding formula: Most funding provided by the province to school boards in support of education comes in the form of either block (per pupil) or categorical (targeted) funding. Block funding provides maximum flexibility for school boards in that it allows them to expend funds in support of locally identified needs. Categorical funding, on the other hand, needs to be directed to specific, centrally-determined priority areas, and the monies provided frequently do not cover the full cost of the service being delivered. We would encourage the government to take this view into account in any review of education funding, and work to restore a more appropriate balance of block and categorical funding in a revised formula.

#### The well-being of children and youth

While the mandate of school boards is technically limited to the in-class experiences of school-aged children, their area of concern is much broader. This is reflected in the Manitoba School Boards Association policy on students, which reads, in part, as follows.

Public schools not only provide academic courses of study for students; they also share in the family and community responsibility for nurturing the whole child, and for helping each one grow into a healthy, happy and contributing member of society. To that end, public schools must:

- recognize the critical importance of the early years for children's healthy development and learning, and support inter-agency cooperation and collaboration to meet the needs of young children and their families.
- mitigate the negative impacts of poverty on students, and ensure that equitable educational opportunities are available to all children and youth, regardless of socio-economic status.
- understand the significant roles good physical and mental health, emotional intelligence and empathy play in overall student well-being and achievement, and support or develop programs and initiatives designed to have a positive impact in these areas.

With this policy position in mind, we would like to comment on some of the specific matters raised in the government's pre-budget discussion paper and survey.

**Balancing the budget**: School boards fully appreciate the value of a balanced budget. Every dollar spent on interest is one dollar that is not available to pay for valuable services for Manitobans. With the specter of rising interest rates before us, debt reduction becomes even more important.

However, we would caution the government against focusing on cost exclusively. Value is often more important, and when it comes to the well-being of children, that is especially true. Developing children are vulnerable, and even a short-term delay in their access to high-quality health, education, childcare or other needed services can have lifelong and devastating effects. Children don't get a second chance at a good start in life. Therefore, we would strongly caution the government not to balance the budget by reducing supports for children and their families, until and unless there is solid evidence that a particular support is not achieving its intended objective.

**Health care premiums**: Health care is obviously a critical service for all Manitobans, and as such, access to high quality and timely health care needs to be guaranteed. Whether or not such access requires the introduction of a health care premium is a discussion that will, no doubt, engender lively debate, but it is not a debate we wish to enter into at this time. What we do want to state unequivocally is that if health care premiums *are* mandated, they must be structured in such a way so as not to negatively impact children or families.

Manitoba continues to have a high number of children living in poverty. Many more live in families with incomes that, while not technically below the poverty line, make it challenging to provide for all of their children's physical and social needs. Health care premiums, if introduced, must not increase such challenges for families. They must not be forced to forego nutritious food, appropriate childcare arrangements, or reasonable recreational activities for their children in order to pay mandated health care premiums.

**Cannabis:** The Manitoba School Boards Association submitted a comprehensive statement outlining its views on the pending legalization of cannabis, which is available on our website at

http://www.mbschoolboards.ca/documents/Advocacy/MSBA%20-%20Minister%20Stefanson%20-%20Cannabis%20-%2016%20Mar%202017.pdf. In the context of the present pre-budget consultation, and as outlined in our March 16, 2017 letter to Justice Minister Heather Stefanson, I would simply like to reiterate that our primary concern is with the well-being of children and youth. Whatever approach it takes to implementing the sale and regulation of cannabis, we would urge the government to make this its priority as well. The potential for the sale of cannabis to generate additional tax revenue for the province must always be a secondary consideration.

Thank you for considering our perspectives on these important matters as you work to develop Manitoba's 2018 budget. We look forward to working with you in the coming months and years to ensure that our province remains a place where all Manitobans, but especially children, can grow and thrive.

In January 2010, the Conference Board of Canada produced a report entitled "Dispelling the Myths: A Pan-Canadian Assessment of Public-Private Partnerships for Infrastructure Investments". This report is accessible on the Conference Board website but is available only to registered users.

Based on the report, the following table highlights a general comparison of conventional public procurement and P3 procurement. As referenced during the presentation delivered by MSBA, it is important for school boards in Manitoba to be aware that this provides general guidance and understanding only. Practice from jurisdiction to jurisdiction does and can vary.

Process	Separate phases (Design, Finance, Build, Operate) procured separately in a "design- bid-build" model through a series of contracts at each juncture of the project. Contracts	Short-term agreements for tendering specific phases of design, construction, FF&E (fixturing) and operation.
